JOHAN HALVORSEN (1864-1935, NORWAY)

Born in Drammen, Buskerud County. He played the violin from early childhood and then studied this instrument at the Stockholm Conservatory and with training with Adolf Brodsky in Leipzig and César Thomson in Belgium. He worked as a soloist, concertmaster and eventually conductor, playing an important rôle in the musical life of Christiania (now Oslo). He was related by marriage to Grieg and was strongly influenced by him. Most of his compositions were for the theater but his orchestral output includes 3 Symphonies.

Born in Stockholm. He studied organ with Alf Linder and musicology with Carl-Allan Moberg. Afterwards, he worked at the music department of the Swedish Radio, where became an important spokesman and advocate of new music in Sweden. In 1972, he became professor of composition at McGill University, Montreal, where he remained until his death. He composed a large catalogue of works in various genres, including an Organ Concerto with String Orchestra (1948, withdrawn).

Born in Frederiksberg (near Copenhagen). In Copenhagen he studied music with J.P.E. Hartmann and Niels Gade and went for further study with Hans von Bülow in Berlin. Then, in Paris, he became Hector Berlioz's first and only pupil. For many years he held the post of director of the Peabody Institute in Baltimore, Maryland. He composed operas, a requiem and orchestral music. His orchestral catalogue includes 7 Symphonies, 5 Nordic Suites and a Jewish Trilogy. His son Ebbe Hamerik was also a composer

ILMARI HANNIKAINEN (1892-1955, FINLAND)

Born in Jyväskylä into a musical family. His father, Pekka Juhani Hannikainen (1854-1924), and his brother Väinö Hannikainen (1900-1960) were both composers and his brother Tauno Hannikainen was a conductor. After studying at the University of Helsinki, he became a pupil of Franz Schreker at the Vienna Musikakademie, continued his studies with Alexander Siloti in St. Petersburg and Alfred Cortot in Paris. When he returned to Finland, he taught piano at the Helsinki Conservatory and afterwards became a professor at the Sibelius Academy. He composed a large body of piano music as well as chamber music, solo songs, a folk opera and film scores.

Born in Jyväskylä into a musical family. His father, Pekka Juhani Hannikainen (1854-1924), and his brother Ilmari Hannikainen (1892-1955) were both composers and his brother Tauno Hannikainen was a conductor. He began studying the piano but then switched to the harp. At the Helsinki Music Institute, he studied the harp with Aino Kajanus and Lilly Kajanus Blenner and then went on for further training in Berlin and Paris. He became the chief harpist of the Helsinki Philharmonic Orchestra. In addition to his Harp Concerto, he composed a Harp Sonata, a chamber opera and a large number of cantatas and solo songs.

Gade, and then had further training at the University of Copenhagen and in Leipzig. He worked as the organist at the St. Johan Church in Copenhagen and at the Christiansborg Palace Chapel. His large catalogue includes operas, ballets, orchestral, chamber, instrumental and vocal works.

He studied the double bass at the Sibelius Academy Oiva Nummelin and had further studies on this instrument with Frantisek Posta in Prague. He then played in the Helsinki Phiharmonic Orchestra Finnish National Opera Orchestra and is acknowledged as one of Finland's leading double bassists in both the classical and jazz genres. He has composed a ballet, orchestral, chamber and instrumental works. His many concertante works include Concerto for Double Bass, Flute, Clarinet, Percussion and String Orchestra (1983), Triple Concerto for 2 Violins, Cello and String Orchestra (1982), Concerto for Improvising Soloist and Orchestra (1974), Concertino Piccola Nos. 1 (1978) and 2 (1980) for Double Bass and String Orchestra and Symphony Concertante for 2-4 Solo instruments and Orchestra (1997).

Born in Helsinki. He studied at the Sibelius Academy in Helsinki where his distinguished teachers of composition were Aarre Merikanto, Einojuhani Rautavaara, Einar Englund, and Joonas Kokkonen. He had further studies in Cologne with Bernd Alois Zimmermann and at the Juilliard School of Music in New York with Vincent Persichetti and Eduard Steuermann. He has taught composition at the Sibelius Academy where his pupils included Magnus Lindberg and Kaija Saariaho. A prolific composer, his catalogue includes opera and works for orchestra, chamber groups, solo piano and voice. Among his

HERMAN D. KOPPEL (1908-1998, DENMARK)

Born in Copenhagen. He attended the Royal Academy of Music in Copenhagen after having studied piano with Rudolph Simonsen and theory with Emilius Bangert but in composition he was wholly self-taught, inspired by among others Bartók, Stravinsky and especially by Carl Nielsen who befriended and advised him. He went on study tours in Germany, France and England and began a teaching career and ultimately became a professor at the Royal Academy. He was a also an accomplished pianist performing jazz as well as classical music, His compositional output was prodigious and ranged from operas to instrumental solos. Among his large orchestral catalogue, only a few of his major concertante works remain unrecorded.
