Introduction to online version

When Alastair Mitchell and Alan Poulton first wrote/compiled this catalogue it was intended as the second of a series of Chronicles of first UK performances. It was to be the second of a projected four individual titles as follows:

Vols. 3 and 4: A Chronicle of First Performances in UK regions 1893-2000. Scheduled to cover UK regional premieres including London venues other than the Promenade concerts. Never published. Entries alphabetically arranged by geographical area - approx. A-L (Vol 3) and M-Z (Vol 4).

It is hoped that Vols 3 and 4 will, in due course, also appear on this site.

Preface

In *The Musical Times* of January 1908 an announcement appeared that a 'List of compositions performed for the first time in London at the concerts founded by Mr Robert Newman in 1893 at the Queen's Hall (1893 is clearly a typographical error. The first promenade concert was given in 1895. Unfortunately, at the time of writing, we have not been able to trace a copy of this list), and taken over by the Queen's Hall Orchestra Limited, in the autumn of 1902' had been published. *The Musical Times* correspondent continued that this useful reference list 'is set forth in chronological form' and hoped that the Directors of the Queen's Hall Orchestra Limited 'may see their way to issue [obviously in the future] so interesting and important a catalogue in the alphabetical order of composers.' More than

ninety years on, the editors of this *Chronicle of First Performances at Henry Wood Promenade Concerts, 1895-2000* have marshalled first performance details of new musical works given their world premières, and first performances in the United Kingdom at Henry Wood Promenade Concerts, thus reflecting the progression of musical ideals, fashion and tastes of over one hundred years. Also, this Chronicle enables us to gauge trends in twentieth-century British musical life, reflected by the growth and development of one of the world's major music festivals.

The source for ninety-five per cent of information for this volume is based extensively upon the Programmes-as-Broadcast [PasB] daily log of output, and Promenade Concert programmes held by the BBC Written Archives Centre at Caversham (Berkshire). These PasBs cover first performances broadcast from the Queen's Hall and the Royal Albert Hall, and are the kernel to all BBC programme activity. Everything the Corporation broadcasts has to be paid for, and it is part of BBC routine that these PasBs provide the most accurate information required for that purpose. Not only is a copy provided for continuity announcers, another copy is forwarded to the Accounts Department for artists' fees to be paid. Where applicable each PasB of broadcast music includes the indication that a specific work is to be given its 'first performance' or a 'first performance in the United Kingdom.' Alastair Mitchell has it on good authority that the typing of each PasB has, and had to be so accurate that if an error was found it had to be corrected.

It should be understood that the British Broadcasting Company (later the Corporation) came into being in 1922, consequently information for the period 1895-1923 is based solely upon the collection of Queen's Hall programmes held by the Department of Portraits at the Royal College of Music. Unfortunately, there are a few programmes, especially for the last decade of the nineteenth century and the first two of the twentieth that are now unavailable. We would be very pleased to hear from anyone who happens to have in their possession concert programmes pertaining to these years. The result is that entries in this volume are frustratingly incomplete, though verifiable information is consistent with that given in *The Musical Times* in the issues for 1895-2000, and the David Cox and Arthur Jacobs's titles (shown in the bibliography).

This book makes no differentiation between broadcast and non-broadcast first performances at Henry Wood Promenade Concerts. Music performed at the concerts, should be left to portray the growth and the development of the festival as a complete entity, and it is only over the last two or three decades that all Promenade Concerts have been broadcast live on BBC Radio 3.

History

As early as 1838 there had been Promenade Concerts held at the Lyceum Theatre, usually of an informal nature though organized by leading London musicians under the generic title of 'Promenade Concerts à la Musard', after the Parisian composer and conductor Philippe Musard who had conducted at the Théâtre des Variétés, the Salles Valentino, and the Opéra Comique.

By the 1840s, aware of the Musard concerts in Paris, the French conductor-cum-impresario Louis Jullien took London by storm by conducting British Army Quadrilles scored for orchestra and four military bands at Covent Garden. This proved hugely successful, though

there could not have been much room for an audience in which to 'promenade'. This may well have been the birth of promenaders simply standing in a 'promenade area' as they do today. Musard came to London to take up the conductorship of the orchestra of the Drury Lane Theatre. He made his debut there on 12 October 1840.

In 1841 Musard took on a similar post at the Lyceum Theatre, the managers clearly believing that the popularity of a promenade concert in their theatre would prove successful. In 1878 and 1879 Arthur Sullivan (best known for the operettas he composed to the words of W.S. Gilbert) conducted Promenade concerts at Covent Garden, where it is believed that he conducted performances of Beethoven's *Choral* Symphony [No. 9] and it was there at Covent Garden, together with Arthur Sullivan which proved to be pivotal roles in the progress of the modern promenade concert, thus taking the progress of musical fashion and taste a step further in the shape of the impression that such promenade concerts had on a young Robert Newman.

When he was appointed manager of the Queen's Hall in 1893 Robert Newman, who up to that time was assistant to the impresario Farley Sinkins at Covent Garden, wished to present a series of 'Concerts d'été' [literally translated as 'Summer Concerts'], the musical content of which Newman wished to base on Julliard and Musard's repertoire.

It was a happy coincidence that Newman scheduled his Queen's Hall summer concerts at the time of the year when London employers would go to the country for their summer break which is why many pre-first world war concerts began in August. The seasons' concerts concluded at the end of October when the employers would return. In some years they even finished in November. Also, there were a few series of concerts given for two or three weeks after the Christmas holiday period in January 1933, 1935, 1936 and 1949 when audiences heard music mainly of the mainstream repertoire. No other winter promenade concerts have been held since, though it was a bold notion on the part of the BBC to hold them; certainly an idea that could be resurrected.

Not on Julliard's military scale, Newman's summer concerts were to be produced along the lines of the currently popular BBC programme *Friday Night is Music Night*, the lightweight, yet patriotic, essence of which is sensed in The Last Night.

Newman had been very impressed by the promising up and coming young twenty six year old conductor, Henry Joseph Wood, who already by 1895 had demonstrated that he had a vast knowledge of many and varying scores of works suitable for Newman's purposes. That knowledge had been acquired by theatrical work, particularly with a run of Thomas' *Mignon* at the Royal Theatre in 1889, of his work with the Carl Rosa Opera in 1891 and the first performance in the United Kingdom of Tchaikovsky's *Eugene Onegin* at the New Olympic Theatre in 1892. He had worked with Sir Arthur Sullivan with the scoring of *The Yeomen of the Guard* and *Ivanhoe* which held him in good stead when meticulously preparing scores and orchestral parts for rehearsal purposes during his conductorship of the Promenade Concerts which had to rely considerably upon ludicrously short rehearsals in the time allowed. (It is well known that much of his time during a Promenade Concert season was taken in marking up scores and parts so that rehearsal time was not wasted.) But above all else was Wood's experience conducting many unknown opera companies and West End musical comedies which must have added considerably to the amount of scores he had to learn.

It has often been asked did the Promenade Concerts make Henry Wood or did Henry Wood make the Promenade Concerts? The answer is categorically 'yes' to the former. Wood was in the right place, London, at the right time when Newman was looking for 'The Right Man'. This was a splendid opportunity for Wood, and he worked hard at making the concerts an important feature of London's musical life. He did not fall into the category of Fritz Busch, Otto Klemperer, Arthur Nikisch, Arturo Toscanini, nor even Sir Adrian Boult or Sir John Barbirolli, all 'career conductors'. Wood's strength was as an educator. He was on the staff of the Royal Academy of Music where he came into contact with musicians such as Arnold Bax; Eric Coates; Norman O'Neill, and John (later Sir John) Barbirolli, who won a scholarship to the Academy (after having entered the Trinity College of Music, similarly). In 1916 Barbirolli (he often brought the Hallé Orchestra from Manchester to function for the Viennese Night (Saturdays) at the Promenade Concerts) became the youngest member of the Queen's Hall Orchestra as a cellist, but he will always be remembered as one of this country's finest conductors. Wood's diary shows that he always made sure of rehearsing the Academy's orchestra twice a week.

Wood educated his promenaders to accept a more sophisticated concert repertoire of symphonies and concertos especially those of the Russian school as opposed to a diet of light overtures, selections from popular stage works and wind instrumental solos. The list that follows shows ten examples of works from abroad, ten of many, which have now become standard orchestral repertoire:-

There are numerous instances when Wood issued instructions in the printed programmes that there should be no applause in between movements of symphonies or concertos. Audiences were requested to wait until the end of such a work and then show their appreciation.

All Promenade Concerts as we know them were first given in the Queen's Hall by the Queen's Hall Orchestra, formed in 1895, and the New Queen's Hall Orchestra founded in 1915, the year in which Messrs Chappell & Co, the piano and music publishing company, announced their decision to discontinue their responsibility of the management of the hall. Arthur Jacobs and David Cox detail in their books the difficulties that had arisen when in the shape of a knight in shining armour the British Broadcasting Corporation came to the rescue.

It is perhaps appropriate here to quote the inscription on the memorial tablet to Newman, placed, we are told by Robert Elkin, 'behind the seat in the grand circle which was reserved for his own use:-

'In Memory of
ROBERT NEWMAN
b.1858-d.1926
Founder of the Promenade Concerts
Queen's Hall
And For Thirty-Two Years
Manager of the Concerts
of the Queen's Hall Orchestra'

Wood was only a member of Newman's staff, but for all his hard and pioneering work it was agreed that the BBC, to quote Wood's own words, 'should have the exclusive right to use the title *The Henry Wood Promenade Concerts*. Thus, as the then Director-General W.J. Haley wrote (30 May 1944) that the most effectual way of linking Wood's name would secure the future of the Promenade Concerts. There was a proviso that in the event of the BBC abandoning the intention that notice would be given to Wood, or his personal representatives, within three months of the end of the last season to which Wood indicated with alacrity that he hoped 'with all my heart that the BBC will never have to give me that three months' advice...' [Refer *The Henry Wood Proms* by David Cox, BBC. 1980]

Wood was enthusiastic in promoting the performance of new music from new British composers. This ideal was just as important as importing new Russian music to English audiences, yet one of the major highlights which dominates the entire history of the Henry Wood Promenade Concerts was when, on one historic, foggy night on the 21 October 1901 promenaders heard for the first time in London Elgar's *Pomp and Circumstance March No. 1 in D*, two days after the first performance in Liverpool given by the Liverpool Orchestral Society conducted by the composer's great friend, A.E. Rodewald. This first London performance was not a Last Night, nor was the work placed at the beginning of part two of the Last Night as has been the custom for many years.

When A.C. Benson's words 'Land of Hope and Glory' were incorporated in 1902 to the music of the trio section of the march the piece became even more popular as a patriotic song.* One wonders what Wood's own thoughts were concerning the position of the march should take at its first performance [in London]. Its popularity (It has to be admitted that Elgar himself acknowledged that popularity by saying that it was 'a tune that comes once in a lifetime.') is measured by the fact that this music broke Wood's strict rule for there being no encores during the time of his conductorship of the Promenade Concerts. It would be safe to say that the Promenade Concerts would not be the same without Elgar, though an adventurous and enterprising conductor who reverted to the original orchestral version should not be condemned. This majestic music stands just as effective on its own without the added words.

Promenade Concerts met a sociological and musical purpose: they were also intended for London's concert going public whose incomes would have been small, and who had remained in London whilst their employers were taking their annual summer break. They would most likely have attended Philharmonic Society concerts.

The development of the New Queen's Hall Orchestra was basically due to the difficulties caused by the controversial 'deputy' system which caused havoc amongst London orchestral musicians, and which ultimately led to the formation by some fifty 'breakaway' instrumentalists of the old Queen's Hall Orchestra to form the London Symphony Orchestra in 1904. In 1927 the British Broadcasting Corporation, formerly the British Broadcasting Company, took over the management of the New Queen's Hall Orchestra. A proportion of those instrumentalists became established as the BBC Orchestra which by 1930 was established as the BBC Symphony Orchestra as we know it today. It is inaccurate to say that the NQHO devolved itself into the BBC Orchestra though many of the NQHO members became founder members of the BBC Symphony Orchestra: these included such names as Harry Blech (violin), Arthur Catterall (violin), F. Vivian Dunn (violin) and Sidonie Goossens (harp) to name but just a few.

The New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians (1980) defines 'Promenade Concerts' as '...Informal concerts at which inexpensive tickets are sold for standing room and floor space...' With some foresight Wood, speaking on the occasion of his Golden Jubilee as a conductor in 1938, said that he felt some 'credit in bringing orchestral music to the people at a price that the people could afford.' Another important highlight in the history of the Henry Wood Promenade Concerts. Archival film has this speech on record; part of it was included in a retrospective film for BBC television, narrated by Richard Baker during a Promenade concert interval on the 19 August 1994.

For many years 'traditional' promenaders looked forward to the 'Beethoven Night' always held on a Friday as part one of the concert. Part two, after the interval (usually given over to the nine o'clock news bulletin in the days when Promenade concerts were transmitted on the Home Service) would often be devoted to a first performance, sometimes broadcast sometimes not, but the essential idea was that audiences would hear the new alongside the traditional mainstream repertoire. A case in point was the first concert hall performance of Roberto Gerhard's *Hymnody* performed in the second half of the concert on Friday 13 August, 1965, given by the Virtuoso Ensemble of London.

Musical fashions and tastes do have a certain habit of re-inventing themselves but some traditions never change. The Last Night still holds its own in these precarious times. When fashions and tastes do change, particularly with Promenade concerts, that change progresses slowly, and can only be discerned by examining concert programmes of a period of ten to fifteen years. The formula for a Wednesday night concert in 1922 included an Elgar overture, a Mozart aria, a piano concerto by Prokofiev, a suite by J.S. Bach, a Mozart symphony, and the 'novelty' of a 'Piemontese' Dance by Sinigaglia, but by September 1937 the sound the Queen's Hall audience heard evoked the essential features of a Finnish landscape at the beginning of Sibelius' Symphony No. 6. with its serenity and modal influences. It had taken fifteen years for the audience to 'appreciate' Elgar and Sibelius (often compared in the same breath), and as a Musical Times correspondent wrote (October 1937) 'change comes gradually at the Promenade concerts...' He was right.

One concert which does not enter into the structure of this book, since it was not part of the series of concerts, but which relates closely to Wood and the development of the Promenade Concerts concerning the first performance on the 2 March 1949 of Arnold Bax's *Concertante* for three solo instruments and orchestra (1949) for a Henry Wood Birthday

Promenade Concert promoted by The Henry Wood Concert Society in co-operation with the BBC in the Royal Albert Hall. Sir Malcolm Sargent conducted the BBC Symphony Orchestra with Helen Gaskell, cor anglais, Ralph Clarke, clarinet, and Aubrey Thonger, horn.

During the 1950s there was less emphasis on the performance of premières and works from abroad being given their first airing at Henry Wood Promenade Concerts. There are numerous works that fall into a category of having not previously been performed at a Promenade Concert (refer to the Methodology) and as the scope of this book is confined to premières these are therefore excluded.

Of all the key figures in the history of the Henry Wood Promenade Concerts, mention must be made of Sir William Glock who was Controller of Music at the BBC from 1959 to 1973. During this tenure of office he developed the Promenade Concerts into what they are today. Through his initiative there was more variety of orchestras playing each season, and the introduction of the high proportion of contemporary music which was clearly reflected in his encouragement of neglected and living composers, this enthusiasm (which must have been kindled during the time he was Music Director at Dartington Hall, tucked in on the Eastern edge of Dartmoor, Devon) clearly matching that of Sir Henry Wood's own ideals. Glock broadened the scope of the Promenade Concerts to include medieval and Renaissance music, semi-staged opera [no longer chunks of Wagner], the inclusion in 1971 of a 'progressive pop

group' in a late-night concert, and one or two brass bands. Perhaps one day a far-sighted controller will include a military and/or guards band, and who knows what future the Promenade Concerts may hold in store.

Methodology

The entries in this volume are for musical works given their world premieres or first performances in the United Kingdom at Henry Wood Promenade Concerts. This means that those works that were given their first performances in the United Kingdom at venues other than the Promenade Concerts are not included. All works included in this volume can be assumed to be world premieres, unless one of the following abbreviations is indicated:

FCP = 'first concert hall performance' [i.e. first concert hall performance in public.]

FCLP = 'first concert hall performance in London'

FEP = 'first European performance'

FLP = 'first London performance'

UKFP = 'first performance in the United Kingdom'

It should be borne in mind that works given their first performance at a Henry Wood Promenade Concert are excluded. They will have had their world premières elsewhere.

2. In order to minimize textual space the reader should remember that all Henry Wood Promenade Concerts up to 1940 were given in the Queen's Hall.

- 3. In order to minimize undue repetition all first performances from 1895 to 1943 should be interpreted as having been conducted by Sir Henry Wood, unless otherwise indicated. The last documented entry for a first performance conducted by Sir Henry Wood was the first performance in the United Kingdom of Nikolay Budashkin's *Festival Overture* on 13 July 1943
- 4. From 27 June 1942 and onwards all Promenade Concerts were given in the Royal Albert Hall unless otherwise shown; from 1971 other venues such as the Round House and various churches in Kilburn and Kensington were used especially for contemporary and small-scale works.
- 5. The spelling of Russian composers' names is expressed in modern form.
- 6. There are various entries in the early years which do not give the names of soloists for concertos and fantasias for solo instruments with orchestra. It appears that it was Sir Henry Wood's practice to use members of the Queen's Hall Orchestra as soloists for these performances. It is now, not possible, to pin-point such detail with concrete accuracy, though some research through relevant issues of The Musical Times will go some way for those who wish to pursue this.
- 7. The existence of the Queen's Hall Orchestra during the 1930s did not end abruptly. The orchestra took it in turn with that of the BBC Symphony Orchestra to perform for Promenade Concerts. Consequently all entries for this period should be regarded as having been given by the Queen's Hall Orchestra, except for those given by the BBC SO which are indicated.
- 8. Up to the time of the Second World War in 1939, and for some time after, the literary media was fond of referring to first performances, first concert performances, or first performances in London, per Sir Henry Wood's favourite phraseology, as 'Novelties'. The Editors of this *Chronicle* have taken the less ambiguous course of defining such novelties in modern terminology.
